

## Uptown Marion Wins State Award for Streetscape Business Support Initiatives

Main Street Iowa hosted the annual Main Street Iowa
Development Awards celebration on April 22, 2022 at
Community Choice Credit Union Convention Center in Des
Moines. The program honored the efforts of those who
work tirelessly to revitalize Iowa's downtowns - the heart
and soul of communities across the state. The awards
honor outstanding accomplishments, activities and people
making a difference in the state's Main Street districts.

Uptown Marion received the Main Street Business
Support Award for the Streetscape Business Support
Initiative. This joint initiative between the Uptown Marion
Main Street Program and the City of Marion was created
to support small businesses through the hardships of the
7th Avenue streetscape reconstruction project.

Local building and business owners Jeanne and Paul Matthews were honored with the Marion Leadership Award presented by Governor Kim Reynolds and Debi Durham, executive director of the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) and Iowa Finance Authority.

"The Main Street Iowa program is a powerful economic development tool that has stood the test of time since its introduction in 1985," said Durham. "We continue to see significant growth in business, jobs, and investment in communities of all sizes because of the program. As a result, these districts serve as inspiring examples of what's possible for Iowa's downtowns."

"Main Street is grassroots economic development," said Michael Wagler, Main Street Iowa State Coordinator. "It is inspiring to witness the impactful work of local Main Street program staff, volunteers, and community partners."

### Uptown Streetscape Update

Rain and some complicated underground work with historic limestone foundations were a challenge to the construction crew in May but crews are on track to finish 10th Street between 7th Avenue and 8th Avenue mid-June. Once North 10th Street is open, the South part of 10th Street (between 6th and 7th avenues) will be closed for phase #3. Reconstruction of this block

stretching from Zoey's to the Draper Building is expected to take a couple of months, weather dependent before moving on to phase #4.

Decorative features such as benches, bike racks, flower pots, hanging baskets, and garden plantings will take place in June on completed portions of the project.

**Curb-less Streets** enhance the festival experience allowing for the street to be closed for large events and easy pedestrian and ADA access to the park and businesses!

**Expanded sidewalk areas** allow businesses to utilize café zones during warm weather months and create vibrancy along the street front.





**Unique gathering places** with artistic seating and fire tables for year-round activity.


# Live Music Returns to City Square in August



Talon Development broke ground on June 10 for a new 4-story, 93-unit apartment building located at 610 Marion Boulevard. The estimated project cost is \$11.5M.



Green Park Apartment Living broke ground on May 11 for a new 147-unit residential development on the former location of the Marion YMCA. The estimated project cost is \$25M.



DMFA LLC broke ground on May 26 for a new 52,300 square foot distribution and warehouse facility in the Marion Enterprise Center. The estimated project cost is \$3.6M.



Twenty 40 Building Concepts broke ground on April 26 for a new 40,000 square foot office and warehouse facility in the Marion Enterprise Center. The estimated project cost is \$4.2M.



Community Housing Initiatives broke ground on June 10 for a new 40-unit affordable housing apartment building for seniors ages 55 and older (image is a rendering of the project). The estimated project cost is \$8.7M.

#### Looks to The Future During Annual Luncheon

Marion Economic Development Corp. (MEDCO) hosted its 36th Annual Luncheon at Prospect Meadows in early May. More than 400 attendees enjoyed the sunshine on a beautiful afternoon at the ballpark as community leaders shared stories of business and community wins.

"Marion gained 20 percent growth in the 2010s," said keynote speaker and Trees Forever CEO, Kiley Miller. "Over the same period, 68 of lowa's 99 counties lost population." The key driver to continued growth in Marion has a lot to do with leaders committed to making Marion the best place to grow a business and raise a family.

Some highlights from the luncheon included:

- MEDCO is now supported by 191 local and regional businesses, an all-time high for the organization.
- Development in Marion remains strong with a focus on multifamily housing and speculative warehouse space now under construction.
- > New programing like the Business Leadership Series, Business Founders, The Story Of, and Startup Spotlight are equipping existing leaders and investment in the next generation of entrepreneurs. Learn more at medcoiowa.org/events.
- > We've intentionally fostered work-based learning opportunities within both Linn-Mar Community School District and Marion Independent School District. Community Promise (communitypromise.org), Marion Community Build (medcoiowa.org/communitybuild), and Venture Academics (medcoiowa.org/venture) are examples of opportunities students can get involved in while learning alongside industry professionals.
- The newly developed Marion Community Index was published in April. This document is a quarterly survey that provides a timely snapshot of challenges

and trends facing local industry. Read the first one at medcoiowa.org/quarterlyindex.

- > The State of Iowa launched two grant programs last year to support investments in Manufacturing 4.0 technology. Woodcrafters in Marion was one of the first companies in the state to be awarded these dollars to support adoption and integration of new technology in their manufacturing process. Attendees heard from Woodcrafters President Dan Sanderson. To date, MEDCO has worked on applications from seven other Marion companies. Learn more by going to medcoiowa.org/manufacturingplan.
- In September, MEDCO will be relocating to the new Broad and Main building along 7th avenue in Marion. The office will be on the second floor overlooking City Square Park. A 30-person training facility will be part of the office space, allowing the MEDCO team to offer Coworking and gathering space to the community.

Attendees were encouraged to stay and participate in a Charitable Home Run Derby to benefit the Miracle League at Prospect Meadows. \$2,000 was raised to purchase permanent seating for the Miracle Field.

## ELPLAST America Celebrates Milestone Through Workforce Innovation

Early in 2021, the leadership team at ELPLAST America found themselves in the same challenging situation as other growing companies. The company had experienced new business growth, and that growth provided the opportunity to install new production lines. The challenge was those lines required new talent. New hires were hard to find and retaining those hires in a competitive marketplace was just as difficult. So, with a new Human Resources Manager, they began making small changes to their hiring process both internally and externally.

"It has taken a great deal of teamwork by all members. Everyone worked hard at getting us to where we are regarding our growth plan," said Sheila Schmidt, Human Resources Manager.

ELPLAST America is a leading manufacturer of press-toclose zipper products for the flexible packaging industry. The Poland based company broke ground on their North American headquarters in 2014 with the goal of supporting aggressive growth plans.

Fast forward to the year 2020 and news headlines begin to shed light on workforce shortages due to the everevolving nature of the COVID-19 pandemic. The leadership team very intentionally evaluated their hiring strategies and job descriptions to better align with feedback from the marketplace. Their success has led the company to running multiple shift configurations allowing them to run production 7 days a week 24 hours a day beginning in early May. It's the first time in the history of their North American operations that they've been able to achieve this goal. Getting to this 24/7 schedule would not be possible without several changes to their hiring practices.

"Our business continues to grow and Elplast is looking at future opportunities to add production to the Marion facility," said Jakub Wronka, Plant Manager for ELPLAST America.

The team at ELPLAST recently shared these small changes that were made to their hiring process:

1 Focus on job descriptions and job titles. "We realized the job title itself sounded too much like a role that could not be obtained by someone new to our industry,"

said Schmidt. By making sure the company intentions are clearly stated in a job description and the job title reflects those intentions, the ELPLAST team saw an uptick in interest.

List pay in job descriptions. Listing the intended pay for available roles saves not only the candidate's time but also the time and effort of the hiring committee.

3 Efficient application process. "We know applicants could decide to accept other job offers if our process isn't smooth and efficient. We must follow up with candidates in a timely manner," said Schmidt.

4 Utilize New Jobs Training 260E dollars. The company was able to use 260E dollars to train new employees on the job while paying the wages of other staff facilitating the training. This program was made available to assist businesses that are creating new positions that require new employee training.

**5** Be flexible and creative. Members of the management team at ELPLAST can be seen working and training alongside new employees. The company feels it is essential to prioritize teamwork, morale, and internal culture by creating an environment that exudes all hands-on deck.

**Ensure employee growth paths are transparent.** Upon interviewing at ELPLAST, candidates are made aware of where they can go within the company to continue growing their skills and pay.

By making small and intentional changes, the company has been able to make big strides on staffing needs and don't plan to stop.

#### Digital Manufacturing Lab Encourages Exploration in Industry 4.0 Technologies

The Digital Manufacturing Lab Powered by Alliant Energy is a partnership between Alliant Energy and Iowa State University's Center for Industrial Research and Service (CIRAS). The lab is designed to help Iowa manufacturers gain advice on using technology that addresses workforce or productivity issues. It also offers the opportunity to test and refine solutions in a risk averse way before investing in them. Chris Hill, director of the CIRAS Technology Assistance Program says, "The lab and its partners are the key to success in helping companies de-risk technology adoption. We can demonstrate how technologies like robotics could be used for various applications and help companies understand the advantages and limitations of the various lab technologies."

The focus of the lab is to serve those who are struggling to make the right choices in an ever-changing landscape and companies that feel stuck because the labor shortage is preventing them from growing the way they would like. CIRAS works with a lot of small to medium-sized manufacturers that could benefit from technology adoption. The lab allows CIRAS to educate manufacturers on the technology with the goal of trying to reduce the fear of the unknown.

One robot based in the lab is called a SCARA, which stands for Selective Compliance Assembly Robot Arm. It's designed to automate processes on a production floor. The machine can complete repetitive tasks, like assembly operations, giving employers the flexibility to use workers for tasks that are more challenging and require problemsolving skills. CIRAS works within the lab to familiarize visitors with new technologies and how they can be I everaged for specific tasks.

The lab also features other tools including a vision system for inspections, smart sensors for vibration and temperature mapping, smart tower lights for remote



monitoring, and additional 3D printers. CIRAS has also added wearable sensors from lowa-based MakuSafe. CIRAS has worked with several companies on the use of the wearable sensors in their plants, which led to the adoption of the technology.
